- Content editing is relatively straightforward
- One of the *most* important parts of our onboarding process and continuing DX



Let's talk about our docs

Developer Docs and User Docs

- Content dates back over fifteen years
- Issues with discoverability (navigating to content)
- Search features are poor
- Easy to get lost in content (in-page navigation)
- Lack of structure (~90% of docs at root)
- Lack of spell checking, linting
- Uses Wikitext when almost everything these days uses MarkDown (familiarity for authors)
- Manual content import
- Documentation not versioned to Moodle releases
- Content not reviewed often
- Offline availability



The benefits of change

Some of the benefits

- Offline support
- Review of documentation before it lands
- Block integration of new features until documentation exists
 - Write documentation as you go and submit at the same time
- Easy bulk changes
- BYO Editor
- Higher quality documentation
- Version-specific documentation
